LEISURE****UK RADIO STATION PLAN FOR BLIND COMMUNITY**

Plans to form a consortium to create the UK's first national radio service dedicated to blind and partially sighted listeners were recently unveiled by a leading charity.

the charity for people with impaired vision who have served in the armed forces, has called on interested parties to form a steering group to explore broadcasting platforms, funding options and content ideas for the service. The UK lags behind other nations that already have bespoke national radio stations for the blind community such as Australia, with its Radio for the Print Handicapped (RPH

and America has ACB Radio, owned and operated by the American Council for the Blind

which webcasts programmes across 70 countries.

There is already an RNIB-backed web-based radio station based in Scotland, VIP ON AIR

Website: <http://www.junction-18.com/viponair/home/view>

which broadcasts from Glasgow to the world. But to date there is no comparable service for the whole of the UK.

"Our vision is to create a service that is dedicated to the needs of the UK's blind and partially sighted communities, but doesn't focus solely on 'visually impaired' issues," says Nick Ward, fundraising and communications director at St Dunstan's. "We have had a lot of interest from blind and partially sighted programme makers. Engaging them in the service will ensure that we take a wide view on content."

The steering group will explore broadcasting the service over BskyB's digital satellite platform, but there are other options, such as webcasting, that it wants to examine. It will also look at potential sources of funding such as grants, sponsorships, advertising sales and donations from members of the steering group.

St Dunstan's says several organisations including the RNIB, the Royal London Society for the Blind

### **SPOKEN TEXT MESSAGES LIVE SOON**

**The telecoms giant BT**

**is set to launch "within weeks" a new service allowing text messages from mobile phones to be sent as synthesized voice messages to fixed-line phones.**

**The service represents an important breakthrough in mobile technology for the blind and partially sighted. "Until recently, SMS [the system used to send text messages] has been a no-go area for blind people," says Julie Howell, digital development policy officer at the RNIB. "But if you can use a landline to receive speech-enabled text messages from mobile users, that represents an interesting opportunity."**

**Users with voicemail can have messages delivered directly into their mailboxes and for those who don't have voicemail, a synthesized voice will deliver the text message to them in an automated phone call.**

**the network services arm of BT, will offer the SMS-to-voice service to other fixed line and mobile operators in the UK. A number of mobile operators have participated in trials and have already signed up for the live service. "We fully expect all of them to come on board," says Andy Jugg, head of messaging products at BT Wholesale. The operators can then determine their own pricing for the service to consumers.**

**BT says the new service could not only benefit people with sight problems who have not been able to use SMS to date, but also**

business users and parents who aren't comfortable with texting but want to keep in touch with their children. "This is a great example of a technology that happens to be particularly useful for the blind and partially sighted, but also has some great mainstream applications," says Howell.

**INTERACTIVE SCULPTURES AT THE MUSEUM IN THE PARK**

**A new exhibition at Stroud's Museum in the Park gives visitors the chance to explore - not just with their eyes, but with all their senses.**

**The gallery space at the Museum is inhabited by two giant sculptures created by Nottingham-based artist Jan Niedojadlo. Heart' and Womb' are huge forms constructed out of recycled waste materials such as rubber, foam, carpet, wood and steel. On approaching these giant pod-like creations, one begins to feel like a tiny Gulliver discovering the world from an entirely new perspective. The sense of wonder and curiosity increases when you discover that each construction has an opening - an invitation to explore the inside as well as look at the outside!**

Jan is internationally renowned and has displayed these particular sculptures in Stockholm and Lausanne.

"When you step inside one of my sculptures you step outside the gallery," he explains. "You enter a world of curious atmospheres and subtle sounds, and a sense of awe and mystery is felt".

These forms are meant to be experienced by the whole body and by all the senses: Hear the heartbeat and feel as if you are being sluiced through the inside of the heart' and then stretch out, relax and allow yourself to be cosily enveloped in the coloured light, camomile smell and comforting cavern of the womb'.

"Our sense of taste, smell, touch, sight and sound are ways in which we understand and communicate with one another. This is what my work is all about. I think we should assess art through our senses first, before reason runs away with itself."

This intriguing and novel exhibition - Extra Sensory Conception - opened on 14th February and runs until 18 April. Admission costs just £1 for adults and is free for children. It is well worth a visit - an out of body experience you'll never forget!

**ACCESS GAP TO NARROW WITHIN FIVE YEARS**

The gap between accessible and mainstream technology in the US will narrow significantly over the next five years, according to one leading expert.

**Mike Paciello, founder and president of accessibility consultancy the Paciello Group**

made the prediction during the course of a seminar broadcast live on the web last week by internet TV station AT508

Website: <http://www.at508.com>

The online debate, 'Homeland security - the roadmap for achieving section 508 compliance'

Website: <http://fastlink.headstar.com/seminar1>

focused on section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act 2001 which requires all US government web sites to be accessible.

**Paciello, who is also co-founder of the World Wide Web Consortium's Web Accessibility Initiative**

Website: <http://www.w3.org/WAI/>

said: "We see an accessibility gap. Advances made within technology where fields of accessibility are concerned tend to lag behind those advances made in mainstream information technology." However, he said: "As a result of compliance with section 508 and World Wide Web consortium standards, what we should see over the next five years is a closing of the technology gap, so we see more products coming out immediately and inherently accessible".

Viewers could email questions to the seminar. According to Paciello, the Department of Homeland Security is leading the way in Section 508 implementation within the US government, which is the single largest employer of people with disabilities in the US.

In making a technology accessible it is crucial to involve users in the testing stages, said Paciello. "If you are solely relying on tools to ensure your web site is accessible, I can guarantee you it will not be; you need to get the users involved". He said there was also a need to educate staff: "Employees need to understand how people with disabilities use these electronic information technologies," Paciello said.

## SPEED UP YOUR CONNECTION

If you are not on broadband and would like to speed up your internet connection, you might like to try this program.

The program is called 'SpeedUp'. The program will give you broadband-like speeds from your normal 56K connection, without the need to upgrade your hardware or do anything to your phone line.

---

**Broadband speeds on a 56K modem may sound like fantasy but it does actually work. Normal transfer rates of 30KB per second can be boosted to around 300 KB per second.**

**And it's British! It works by using a nine patent approved compression technology. You download a small program and subscribe to the service**

**Cost: £24.99 per year**

**The result is a near broadband experience. It's not quite as good as a true broadband connection but you should get 70% of the benefits for 10% of the cost.**

**You can't make phone calls while you are on line and already compressed information, such as MP3 files, is currently limited to about a 30% speed increase.**

**New algorithms due soon will show marked improvements. It is only available for Windows platforms at present but should be available for Mac by April 2005.**

**Once installed, it is fairly easy to optimise and off you go.**
